of QCED for the last few years, and has helped navigate through difficult COVID times, working to re-establish a show in Ocean Shores. He is a giving person, who has quietly coached and helped many new barbershoppers to grow in their understanding of our style, and will always deflect to give credit to others.

He is a master tag teacher, encourager of all people in barbershop, has directed men's and women's choruses, and is a wonderful arranger, trumpet player, and builder of airplanes! He has received numerous accolades and awards at the schools where he has taught. Welcome – Mr. Menefee – SIR!!



**The Barbershop Reunion of Friends**, otherwise known as the Evergreen District Barbershop Chorus and Quartet Contest and Convention was held in Federal Way on Friday and Saturday, October 21st & 22nd. I think we proved that Barbershop Harmony is alive and well in the Evergreen District. The quality of the performances by the choruses and quartets that I was able to attend was the best I have ever heard aside from BHS International Contests. The contests ran smoothly thanks to the help of the Jet Cities Sweet Adeline Chorus and other volunteers (I'm talking about you especially, Deena Wolfe). There were over 500 people registered as contestants, judges, helpers and audience. The hotels and restaurants in the area were very appreciative.

A decision was made early on to make the contest open to all attendees, as it had not been possible to have qualifying Division Contests. This was problematic, as we had no way of knowing how many people would be coming in order to come up with a budget and to make arrangements for enough discounted hotel rooms. However, it turned out to be very successful, and it should be considered as a probable future format for district contests. When you think about it, even if you have to travel further in order to participate, it is actually less expensive for each individual to make one trip with the associated expenses rather than having to pay for two contest entries and the expenses associated with a Division Contest and a District Contest. You also have the opportunity to get together with barbershop friends from throughout the district.

One of the nicest comments I heard came from the staff of the Performing Arts and Events Center. They really enjoyed the performances and said everyone was so friendly, polite and well-behaved.

## FROM THE DISTRICT CONTEST AND JUDGING GUY (DRCJ)

It was great to see everyone in Federal Way and I had some wonderful feedback about EVG from the judging panel. They were very impressed with the level of performance they heard in both the quartet and chorus performances. But behind the scenes leading up to the contest, I had my hands full, so I wanted to mention to you some things that will make entering a BHS contest easier:

1. Make sure YOUR BHS membership is current well in advance of contest. I check every member of every quartet and discovered several quartet members whose membership had lapsed. I then had to email (even text) those members to remind them to get paid up before the contest day. (I even had one competitor who finally

paid up *two* days before the contest started!) And since I don't know in advance which members of a chapter will sing in a chorus, it's up to the chapter administrator (usually the secretary) to make sure all performing members are current with their dues. A performer whose dues are not current will cause a disqualification for the group. (If I know ahead of time that a quartet member is not current, that quartet won't be permitted to compete.)



- 2. Make sure your quartet registration is current. I check every quartet to make sure that the group is current with quartet dues. We had no issues at the fall contest.
- 3. Make sure that your quartet/chorus repertoire contains the songs you plan to sing at the contest. Choruses need a minimum of two songs in their repertoire, and quartets need to have a minimum of four songs (two songs for each round) in their repertoire—unless the *only* award you're trying for is one round (like the BHS Sen-

iors Prelims). A group can add songs to its repertoire even the day before it takes the stage! And furthermore:

- 4. Please don't sing any arrangements that are not in your group's repertoire list! You might have noticed on the Quartet OSS [Official Scoring Summary] "Song Not In Group's Repertory". The administrative judges pull songs directly from your rep list and that goes onto the score sheet. When you sing something not listed in your repertoire, the ADM judges cannot manually add it in. At the district contest, at the behest of the ADMs, I had to track down immediately several quartets who sang songs not in their repertoire list. To avoid disqualification, the group had to provide me that night with the title of the song, the name of the arranger and, most important, proof *that the chart was legally purchased*. I can't stress enough how important this is. We did have one quartet who was disqualified for singing an illegal chart. So, make sure your group's repertoire list is all squared away *before* you enter a contest. (If your group needs help adding an arrangement to your repertory, I'm happy to help!)
- 5. Make sure to choose your evaluation preferences. Once the draw is done and the session is "closed," the quartet/chorus admin receives an email asking the group to choose its evaluation preferences. Does your group prefer three, shorter sessions with a judge from each category, or would you prefer a single, longer session with just one judge? This past fall, the email that went out to each group didn't have as its header "choose your eval preferences", but this information was buried inside the email along with other information. Thus, it was often ignored. I've been told that the C&J folks at BHS are modifying this step of the contest entry process to make it apparent that the group needs to act. Groups that don't choose a preference will have one selected for you (by yours truly).

So, following these steps will save headaches down the road and make the contest entry procedure run very smoothly. Please feel free to reach out to me if you have any questions.



## **EVERGREEN DISTRICT CONVENTIONS IN 2023**

#### A Message from the District Events Team

#### **Open Invitation to District 2023**

One of the outcomes of the pandemic is the reluctance of chapters to host Division conventions in 2023 due to the financial risk. The House of Delegates and Board recognize this issue and approved the suspension of Division contests in 2023. As a result, as in 2022, there will be an **Open Invitation** to all quartets and choruses to compete in the 2023 District Convention. Mark your calendars for October 20-21, 2023. Location and venue to be announced.

#### **Quartet Impact**

Almost 30 quartets attended the District convention in 2022. With no Division qualifying required, we may expect even more quartet contest entries next year. We have approval for a triple panel of judges to accommodate more quartet evaluations. We may also need to offer 2 sessions of Friday afternoon and night qualifying; one proposal is 4-6pm and 7-9pm to give the judges a supper break.

#### **Spring Quartet Prelims**

The House of Delegates also approved a Spring Quartet Prelims for all quartets vying for a spot at International next year. The initial proposal is that both sessions of qualifying take place on a Saturday (morning and evening) with Harmony College Northwest education "Ted Talk" sessions during the afternoon. If the quartet finals at District are an indication, Spring Prelims is a must-see event! The dates being explored are April 22 and 29, 2023. Location and venue to be announced.

Also being considered is that Senior Quartet Prelims be held at Spring Prelims instead of at the District Convention. This would allow qualifying Seniors Quartets a few more months to prepare for MidWinter. **Seniors Quartets, what do you think of that idea?** Contact Events@evgdistrict.com

- 12 Months of <u>Marketing Tidbits</u>, including articles, experience, and opinions.







## THE LIFE & TIMES OF DUANE CHRISTENSEN (1955-2022)

Duane Christensen joined SPEBSQSA in 1973 at age 18, after having scalped a ticket to see part of the International Barbershop Convention here in Portland. He enjoyed it so much that he sought out a member of the Rose City Close Harmony Music Men (RCCHMM) and showed up at their next rehearsal ready to join the chorus. It just so happened that Tim McCormic (Mike McCormic came a little later), showed up that same evening with our dad, Dick McCormic, who was a current member of the chorus. Later that fall, the RCCHMM put on a chapter show. My sisters and I were the door ushers for the show. When we went backstage to find our dad and brothers, we ran into brother Tim and Duane heading up the elevator. Tim introduced us to Duane as his "obnoxious sisters". The elevator doors closed and Duane grabbed Tim's lapels and shouted "YOU HAVE FIVE SISTERS?!" Needless to say, that was the beginning of the McCormic-Christensen-Miller clan. Duane and I were married in May of 1977, and had three children, Ian, Eric and Andrea (who married Justin Miller).



Duane was involved with chorus and District administration throughout his many years as a member. He was the District Communication Officer in 1997 and VP of Marketing & Public Relations in 1998. He and Bob Cox played major parts in bringing the 2002 and 2012 International Conventions to Portland, and were co-chairmen of those conventions. Duane was always very involved in the chorus administration, always pushing to make the Evergreen District something to reckon with. He also volunteered to be stage manager for several local SPEB and Sweet Adeline shows.

Over the years, Duane was a member of several choruses and quartets, all from the Portland and Salem areas:

#### **Choruses:**

**Rose City Close Harmony Music Men** (1973-1984); **Vocal Gentry Chorus** (which he helped get started, 1985-1998), and most recently, **Vocal Summit** (which he also helped get started, 2021-2022).

#### Quartets:

Out of the Blue (1987-1989); DICE (1991-1995, 3-time champs at Forest Grove Ballad Town Contest); Rip City Sound (1992); 3 Outa Four (2007-2009, 2-time Forest Grove champs, District Champs in 2008, International competitors 2007, '08 and '09); 7<sup>th</sup> Heaven (2011-2013 and 2018-2019); and Dads & Lads (2021-2022).

Duane was most proud of singing alongside his sons Ian and Eric in **DICE** and **3 Outa Four**, and most recently with **Dads & Lads**, with son Eric, son-in-law Justin Miller and his Justin's dad, John Miller. Duane tried his hardest to hang on to compete in the 2022 Evergreen District contest in October with **Dads & Lads** and **Vocal Summit**, but fell short, as he passed after a 10-year battle with bladder cancer on August 29, 2022, at the age of 67.

He loved his barbershop family to the end! Someone recently stated that "you are never a stranger to Duane, you love him the minute you meet him!" He brought many members into the society with his enthusiasm and encouragement, and inspired others to serve in leadership and volunteer roles as a way of paying it forward. Thankfully, his dynasty will continue through his sons, and daughter, through to his grandsons and granddaughters, and beyond! **It's great to be a barbershopper**!

Roger Haag was a barbershopper from the late 1960's till about 2005. As a member of the Olympia Chapter, he sang lead and then baritone with the Puget Sounders Chorus. He sang in numerous quartets, including two Evergreen District Champion Quartets. His first quartet endeavor was with the **ARTESIANS**, beginning in 1968 and culminating in the District Championship in 1972. Singing lead in this quartet, the other members were Dick Fankhauser (tenor), Jack Anderson (bari) and Ken Born (bass).



It wasn't until 1995 that he won another quartet championship – this time with a foursome called **EXTRA EXTRA** – members of this quartet were Mike Langthrop as tenor, Bob Swanson as lead, Forrest Lamotte as bass and Roger as baritone. Other quartets he was affiliated with were: **Interstate Four, Intercity Express and Common Bond** as well as a short time as the baritone replacement with the **Commencement Bay Flounders and Seafood Conspiracy** (District quartet champs from 1976).

Formed in 1968, the Artesians have been referred to, among other things, as a bubbling quartet with an exciting sound. In 1968, they had their first taste of competition and placed seventh out of twenty eight quartets. The past two years they placed second out of the same number competing. All four members of the

quartet are enthusiastic members of the Puget Sounders Barbershop Chorus, the Olympia Chapter of S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A.

Contact man for the quartet is Dick Fankhauser, tenor. Dick is a Landscape Architect for the State of Washington. He is married and has two children. Roger Haag, lead, is employed by the Olympia Brewing Company. Roger is married and has two children. The jolly baritone, Jack Anderson, is owner-operator of Anderson's Refrigeration. He is also chorus director for the Olympia Chapter of Sweet Adelines, and the Olympia Chapter of S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A., Inc. He is married and has one son serving in the United States Navy.

Rounding out the quartet with his mellow low notes is bass, Ken Born. Ken is an elementary school counselor. He is married and has four children. Ken is also the assistant director of the Olympia Chapter of S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A., Inc. and director of the newly licensed Two Town Tuners of Centralia and Chehalis, Washington.



## CHAPTER ETERNAL—Dave Collins (1940-2022)

David Lloyd Collins came from a singing family in Southern Manitoba and began his barbershop singing days with the Winnipeg Chapter in the early 1960's. After moving to Calgary, he sang with the Calgary Chapter / Stampede City Chorus for many years before becoming a charter member of the Calgary Foothills Chapter and the Western Hospitality Singers (later named Acappella Road). He will be dearly missed as a very willing and a dependable bass singer. The following is one of several tributes to Dave.

#### Dave Collins – A real friend ...

It is not unusual for males to have friends. But so often, men have friends that are functional, for lack of a better description. Like work friends ... associated with work. Or party friends, associated with going out for drinks or to a game.

Rarely do we find men friends that are enduring, that work at maintaining that connection and that support you relentlessly and tirelessly. To me, Dave was that kind of friend —Enduring—right from the first day I met him at chorus practice ! I was pretty intimidated coming out to sing with a group of men, and even more intimidated after I heard them sing ! Dave welcomed me ... immediately, as an equal, and continued to contact me every week to ensure that I continued to come out to practice! He helped me with my audition song, Mood Indigo, a tough bluesy tune that I had never heard before.

During our singing breaks, Dave would come by and always "check up" on me. Eventually, we would meet for coffee, or the odd lunch. It seemed that we had some things in common besides singing! I was in the construction industry and Dave was in the planning industry, so there was a bit of a cross-over that brought us together. Soon we were in a quartet together, with Doug Gardner and Bob McCulloch, taking third place in 1996 at our Division contest singing Irish tunes!! We were called **On The Fringe.** 

Dave and I always fancied ourselves as Scotch enthusiasts, but the reality was we would enjoy a glass or two, especially during Barbershop Conventions, and have many conversations, laughs and tears well into the late evening hours! It became a tradition to share a glass or two at every convention at what we dubbed as the "Scotch Room". It wasn't all Scotch and singing. There were many times where we would engage in an open hearted exchange of our emotional lives. OK, followed by a song or a glass of scotch! J

Ours was a friendship without fear of judgement, a friendship that was freely chosen, and one that brought much enjoyment. I miss him.

## **HOW DO YOU GET STUFF DONE?**

How do you get stuff done? This is the core point of leadership, and for chapter leaders it is an especially important question because in a barbershop chapter, everyone is a volunteer. While we may possess some management or leadership skills we learned in the business world, the fact that our chapter members are volunteers changes everything we think we already know.

If you can't tell them what to do, then how the heck do you get stuff done? Getting stuff done is quite a bit easier than you might think. It just requires you to approach things a little differently than you might have done in business. In this article, I will give you two practical tools you can use. I will offer more in the next issue of the *Timbre*.

**Practical Tool #1**. Think Before you Act. This is so fundamental that most of us don't even give it a thought, *which is precisely why it is so important*.



When a situation arises that needs leadership, what do most leaders do? They start throwing out ideas and declarative statements hoping something will work. In other words, they try to show they are in charge. Unfortunately, this approach often creates confusion just at the time clarity is needed. The best chapter leaders don't do this. They think things through before jumping in.

**Practical Tool #2**. Ask Appropriate Questions. When a problem arises in your chapter or chorus, what's your job? To solve the problem, right? WRONG!

When we become chapter leaders most of us assume that we are supposed to be able to solve the problems or, at the very least, know what needs to be done. Nothing could be further from the truth. Your job is **to get the job done!** No matter how long you have been part of the barbershop world or how much knowledge you have amassed over the years, you cannot have the answer to every problem. Thus, the way to get the job done every time is to ask questions. <u>More importantly, it is your responsibility to ask questions because if you don't, no one else will.</u> The uncomfortable truth is that if leaders don't ask questions, chapters wither and die.

Many leaders don't ask questions because they mistakenly believe that if they give any indication they don't know what to do, members won't respect them and may doubt their ability to be in charge. Again, WRONG! What's your job? **To get the job done!** You don't need to know the answer to the problem, but you do need to know how to find it. You do this by asking questions—appropriate questions.

So, what are appropriate questions? First, it is critically important for you to understand the power of the words you use. The words you choose can send very different messages from the questions that you ask. *What's your problem?* or *Don't you know better than that?* are closed questions that can create defensiveness and reduce the likelihood of getting any helpful answers.



A better kind of question is one aimed at getting people to think and allow them to offer their own answers. Here are three great questions:

#### What's Going Well? What's Not Going Well? What Could Be Done Better?

These are positive, open-ended, and empowering questions. To use them effectively, ask one question at a time and listen carefully to the answer. Then ask a follow up question based on what you heard. This

simple technique lets the person know you heard them and are interested in what they say. It is guaranteed to get the other person talking. After all, isn't that the point of the question?

## WHY CHAPTERS NEED TO GET SHOW CLEARANCES

As chapters gear up for their holiday shows, it is an important time to remind ourselves to ensure that we get the needed show clearances in advance. Show clearances provide three important features:


- 1. By licensing the music with the country-appropriate agency, chapters protect themselves and BHS from complaints or litigation over copyright infringement for use of the music.
- 2. The district secretary will check your show for any conflicting BHS or SAI shows within 60 miles on the same day. This avoids potential audience splitting between competing shows and when conflicts arise give the chapters an opportunity to join forces with the other groups for joint shows. Often chapters will get ahead of the game and work with nearby barbershop groups to build bigger and better shows and bigger audiences!
- 3. And finally, once your show is cleared, your EVG District Communications Team is available to help publicize your show through the email newsletter distributions and website to let others in the district know where and when your show is taking place.



So as soon as you know where and when your show will be taking place, start the clearance process on the EVG website at:

https://evgdistrict.com/show-approvals/ and reap these benefits for your chapter.





## **CALLING ALL CANADIAN CHAPTER SECRETARIES!!**

Earlier this year Harmony Hall released updates to the show licensing process for Canadian chapters. Effectively, these changes catch the official process up with what some chapters had already discovered for themselves and were doing – that is using Entandem to complete SOCAN filings. With the new process, they released new forms with updated instructions and appropriate references to steps using Entandem.

We have updated the Evergreen show clearance web page (go to evgdistrict.com) to provide the new forms and updated instructions to align with the new BHS process. The key steps of that process are:

Prior to the show, use the EVG web form for initial notification to the District of the planned show.

On confirmation that the date has no current conflicts, complete the first page of the provided BHS form and send it to the District Secretary. Since no payment is involved and to save time by avoiding international postal travel, you can submit the signed form electronically by scanning and sending by email. Based on this form, the Secretary can provide final



District clearance, send required information to BHS, and enable the District Communications Team to publicize the show.

Within 30 days following the show, complete the SOCAN process through Entandem following the instructions provided and make payment either by mailing a check or via Electronic Funds Transfer using the account and instructions provided.

That's it! Hopefully it is clearer and more efficient now with the revised instructions. And thanks to the chapters that have patiently worked through surfacing these revisions as they sought to clear this year's holiday shows.

We arrived at some church and she grabbed my arm and pulled me in, saying calmly 'I've got a surprise for you.' She introduced me to a few women and led me to a special woman across the room and said "stay with her" which I did. As the women all got on (what I now know are) risers, they started singing — I started singing — and I started crying!!!

Every woman around me had lovely low BASS voices -- and I could hear other parts as well. My world was changed that night - thanks to that invite!!"

So why is this article titled "**Seven Thirty-Six**"? At your next rehearsal, at 7:36 look around at those who you are singing with. Each of them has at least one story that happened weeks or years ago that has kept them coming back for more! Every member is so special and brings such value to our chapters!

My membership tip is to keep "barbershopping alive from the inside-out". Celebrate together the joys, the friendships you've made, the support you've given each other and the beautiful music that you all make together.

Do you know someone who needs to feel the joy of singing with others?

It's not about committees like marketing or membership - it's about individually realizing why you're singing and caring enough to tell others:

- Touch people
- Build relationships

Show how much you care.



## HISTORIAN'S CORNER—CONTEST MEMORIES

With a spectacular District Contest having just past, I thought it'd be fun to share some memories of other contests pulled from our District's past.

**1973:** Then, with a rush of last-minute efforts, the 35th Annual International Convention arrived in Portland. Before the week of July 9 to 14 was over there would be more than 7,000 barbershoppers and friends signed up for the gathering. Festivities were officially inaugurated with the christening, with imported shaving lotion, of a 71-foot barberpole (set in front of the Coliseum). The headquarters hotel was the Hilton (singles started at \$20) and the halls of all the hotels plus the sidewalks throughout downtown, rang with the harmony that everyone loved. Said Doug Baker, of the *Oregon Journal, "…*who could ask for nicer visitors? Best of all they brought their sweet harmony, and nobody knows how many thousands of songs." Tours during the week included a salmon barbecue, a trip to Mount Hood and Timberline Lodge, and a trip up the Columbia Gorge. The planning that Chuck Olson and his crew of the three local chapters had done bore the fruit of a very successful convention. Their hard work made this first Evergreen International something to be remembered warmly and fondly. A symbol of the hospitality was the gift of a rose handed to everyone who entered the Coliseum for the Saturday night finals — 7,000 roses in a gesture of love that would be remembered by all.



**1981 District:** A sidelight to the chorus contest was the set put on by the Tualatin Valley **Harmony Masters**. The set had a cowboy theme and the chorus dressed to represent a down at the heels gang of old cowhands in a western setting, complete it is used to be a set of the set of th

with cactus. In order to give the presentation some atmosphere, the chorus brought a bag of fresh cow manure to Vancouver (we're told that there was no trouble with this import at customs). The manure, in containers, was put under the risers and electric fans were placed to waft this subtle odor out into the auditorium and really set the tone for the set. The effect was not as desired. The chorus almost gagged while waiting for the curtains to be opened and then, when the curtains were opened, there was a draft created (similar to when the damper is opened in a fireplace). The chorus gagged again, no odor made its way into the audience and our nose-challenged singers made the best of a stunt gone a bit askew.

**1988:** Eugene's **Cascade Chorus** went to San Antonio to clown around. They did it with all of the splash of any Ringling Brothers circus. The action on the stage was just outstanding and the stage presence score of 514 points was bettered by only two chorus sets, one by Dallas (the winner) and one by third place Scarborough with 515 points. However, the rest of the categories did not measure up as much as all would have liked and the gang took a tenth place — the best since Eugene had done the same thing five years before. Director Denny Stiers and his 67 clown compatriots had every reason to be proud of their performance. During the week, the clowns walked around town in their costumes–and got major coverage, with a color photo on the front page of the Sunday issue of the San Antonio's Express News that said:

"CLOWNING AROUND Members of the Cascade Chorus from Eugene, Ore., (left to right) Reid Stewart, Denny Stiers, Marty Bauer and Jerry Harrison, belt out a song during the 50<sup>th</sup> International Convention of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singers of America."

At the end of the story, the newspaper concluded: *Vocal Majority of Dallas won the choral competition at the San Antonio gathering, while the Chiefs of Staff from Illinois won the quartet competition.* Way to go Cascade!!!!



1991: District Prelims, Saturday Night Surprise. The Prelims this year were held in conjunction with the Division 4 Contests in Hillsboro, OR on the last weekend in April. Of 21 quartets at the Friday night semi-final, ten would move to the Saturday night finals. Tualatin Valley's Aliens were in the contest and made it to the finals, where they had a special surprise planned for all. There they took advantage of their comedic talents to present a set in which they lip-sync'd their way through two taped Boston Commons numbers. The important thing is that it means you sing the notes an octave *below* where you would normally play the treble clef notes on, say, the piano."

"Why do that?" asked Aaron, his brow furrowed.

"Oh! Just expediency. It tends to keep our notes within the staff, not flailing about on ledger lines above and below. Here," she said, writing quickly on a blank staff from her notebook. "I'll show you. If we wrote both the lead and tenor notes in the "ordinary" *treble* clef, it would look like this:"

"See what a mess it is? I can't even fit in the lyric!" she said, with building enthusiasm. Her pencil flew over the staves. "Now, if we wrote both the lead and tenor in the "regular" *bass* clef, it would look like this:"

"Oh!" said Aaron. "That would put the tenor notes *way* above the staff much of the time!"



"Correct," said Rachel, pleased that Aaron was understanding. "We have a similar tool in the ladies' notation." She pointed to the women's section of "Lida Rose."

"See the little 8 above the bass clef? That tells us to sing an octave higher, for the same reasons. It just makes life easier. It is confusing for a little while, then your brain adjusts to it like you had been reading this way your entire life."

## **CHAPTERS IN ACTION**

#### Historic First: Alberta Harmony Cabaret Fills a Niche!

In the late 1800's, harmonizing in four-parts was simply a way to celebrate and build community. It was a way to connect through song, a way to grow camaraderie, a way to strengthen a culture of recreational singing; a place where one could step away from the stresses of day-to-day life and just enjoy each other's company.

It wasn't until half a century later, in 1939, that the first formal barbershop quartet contest took place. The rest is history. Today, quartets and choruses around the world compete each year to celebrate the unique barbershop sound. At each Division, District, and International Convention babershoppers gather to enjoy the main events of the quartet and chorus competitions followed by coaching, socializing, and more singing—tags, polecats, and afterglows. Then, after a hectic couple of days and sleepless nights, everyone returns home satiated with song and happily spent. It all happened so fast!

If only there were ALSO a way to recapture some of that original relaxed, recreational feel of what barbershop used to be like! Just a group of people coming together to socialize, sing and enjoy a few laughs along the way! Wouldn't that be great!

Well now there is ! It's a Harmony Cabaret and that's exactly what happened in Calgary, Alberta on October 1<sup>st</sup> of this year.

On that day, about sixty singers from the SA and BHS world came together for a mash-up of an Afterglow and a Harmony Platoon. The Afterglow structure with its tables, food, drink, socializing, tag singing and quartet performances set the mood for a day that went from 1 pm - 8 pm. (This allowed those driving 3-4 hours one way to still make it a day trip.)

But the mini-Harmony Platoon added the 'entertainment component.' A Mini-Platoon is just like a Harmony Platoon except with fewer, simpler, and shorter songs. You can find out more about a Harmony Platoon at <a href="https://www.harmonyplatoon.org/">https://www.harmonyplatoon.org/</a>).

In our case, 25 singers participated in our random pick-up quartets. They were given just a short time to practice before they 'sang-off' against each over two rounds. After a delicious dinner, winners from each round sang off for final bragging rights chosen by our informal judging panel of experienced barbershoppers. A special category used a QR code which allowed our audience members to vote for their winning quartet online.

To close the day, we had a final mass chorus performance for anyone who had purchased the sheet music with their ticket and learned our three songs: Under the Boardwalk, Side by Side, and Can You Feel The Love Tonight? As the day drew to a close, earning a 9/10 rating, a common sentiment expressed was that the relaxed pace and warm atmosphere of the Harmony Cabaret was a great way to celebrate our original barbershop purpose, recreational singing for the love of harmony. Though conventions are great, there is so much 'stuff' to jam into two days, it's difficult to find a 7-hour niche where one can just make music with like-minded individuals and enjoy each other's company.

A Harmony Cabaret fills this niche and reminds us, that coming together in song is what keeps "Everyone in Harmony." Our international culture is something truly unique that sets the barbershop style from other choral organizations; something worth celebrating and preserving.

As for the next Cabaret that was consistently asked for by participants — Stay tuned! We'll begin planning as soon as our Christmas Shows are over!
