ATTENTION CHORUSES AND QUARTETS—NEWS ABOUT FALL CONTEST!! By Jay Krumbholz, EVG District DRCJ

As I write this, the fall convention is just over eight weeks away. Does your quartet want to sing at the contest? Well, don't wait. **September 22** is the deadline to enter! As of this writing 27 quartets have already entered the contest! We still have room for seven more; after that, I'll create a waiting list in case any of the current quartets have to withdraw.



To make contest entry easier for your quartet, make sure of a few things:

- The quartet's BHS registration is current
- That each quartet member's individual BHS membership is good through October 22. Also, each quartet member must belong to EVG as their district. (In case you didn't know, Frank Thorne simply means a member does not belong to any particular *chapter*.)
- The quartet's repertoire list contains any/all songs your group may sing at the contest. At the very least there should be 4 songs, but you may list as many as you like. There's a process to follow for adding custom charts to your repertoire—and getting those added takes a little time, so plan ahead.
- Each member of the quartet must purchase **one** all-events registration for the convention. (You do not have to purchase a separate registration to sing in the chorus contest.)

Please not on the contest entry form if you share a member with another quartet. That way I'll make sure not to schedule them back-to-back! (Did you know that you can sing in more than one quartet for the district contest, but are limited to only one quartet for any BHS International qualifying contests?)

As each quartet submits the contest entry form, yours truly checks every quartet member to make sure he or she satisfies the first three bullet points above. When I approve the quartet's entry form, I notify the quartet contact person of any issues that need to be rectified before the contest. (For example, singing in contest with a member whose BHS membership has expired results in an immediate disqualification.)

We also have twelve choruses that have entered the contest so far, and there's room for lots more. So, if you're the authorized person for your chapter who takes care of this task, let's get to it! And don't forget that you can bring a group of less than 12 members to the contest. Your VLQ won't be eligible for any awards, but you do get to perform for a terrific audience and receive coaching from the judges.

This meeting is vitally important to all of us because the HOD is the supreme legislative and governing body of the Evergreen District. Although the District President, supported by the Board of Directors, manages the routine affairs of the District, it is the HOD which governs us.

The HOD is comprised of delegates from each chartered chapter (*That's You!*), along with members of the current Board, and former District Presidents.

EVERGREEN DISTRICT EVENTS TEAM By Deena Wolfe, 2023 District Events Team Co-Director

Hi everyone!

<u>Did you know that the Evergreen District has a District Events Team (DET)?</u> The District Events Team was formed to coordinate District Events, including the annual District Convention, and Spring Events such as the Quartet Prelim contest.

I am your 2024 Evergreen District Director of Events (working with Rob MacDonald in 2023) and Chair of the 2023 District Convention in Federal Way WA October 20-21, 2023.

Because the DET is new, and COVID set us back a couple of years, the 2023 Fall Convention will be the first District Convention hosted by the DET.



I am looking for people to join the DET and working with me on upcoming District Conventions. Here are the roles which are a part of the team.

- <u>District Convention Chair</u> who oversees the planning and implementation of the District Convention working with volunteers and the others on the DET. Reports to the District BOD. I am filling this role.
- <u>Facilities/Venue Specialist</u> works with local chapters to locate appropriate venues and nearby hotels for District Events.
- <u>Volunteer Coordinator Specialist</u> works with everyone who volunteers to support the District as event volunteers, including recruiting volunteers for various positions. For specific chapters/choruses who want to volunteer together, there could be fundraising opportunities and this person would work with that Chapter.
- <u>Registration Specialist</u> handles all the pieces and parts of registration for the event, including online/in person registration and producing the All Events name tags used at the event.
- <u>Event Treasurer</u> works directly with the Evergreen District treasurer regarding all things money keeping the events budget and getting expenses covered.
- <u>Competition Specialist</u> coordinates pieces of the convention regarding competition such as the chorus/ quartet matrix, assigning warm up rooms and runners and working back stage during the competition.
- <u>Communications</u> provides information to the District BOD communications team regarding the convention. Is responsible for the District Contest program. They could work with a local chapter/chorus for a fundraising opportunity to sell advertising space in the program. They would work with the other members of the DET to provide information for District publications such as the Greensheet and Timbre.
- <u>Judges specialist</u> this roll is currently filled by the DRCJ (Director of Contest and Judging as far as registering for contest with BHS and the quartet/chorus draw. They would work with another volunteer to help provide additional hospitality to the judges in regards to meals, transportation etc.

Do any of these roles sound interesting? Typically we meet via ZOOM on a monthly basis and then increase that frequency as we approach a convention. There are incentives such as an included AET if you are not a competing member. Are you interested in volunteering for the 2023 District Contest? Please get in touch with me. 

MUSICAL INSIGHTS FROM DON THORN (BOB ROBSON THIS MONTH)

O CANADA – THE NATIONAL ANTHEM OF CANADA

In the past several issues of the Evergreen Timbre Don Thorn has written very interesting articles about songs that we often sing. His fascinating exploration of the origin of each song is both entertaining and informative. In the June issue of the Timbre, Don discussed the origin of the National Anthem of the United States, "The Star Spangled Banner", composed by Francis Scott Key in 1814 during the War of 1812-14 (started when the US invaded (ahem) Canada—then a British colony). Don suggested that the Canadian Anthem should also receive historical review and asked that a Canadian Evergreen barbershopper write such an article – so here goes.



"O Canada" – the current Canadian National Anthem – has a history that is somewhat long and complex. It originally started with a melody written by Calixa Lavallee in 1880 to serve as a march for a Quebec holiday – Saint Jean Baptiste Day. Original French lyrics (after all, Canada does have two official languages – English and French) were written shortly after by Sir Adolphe-Basile Routhier. The original French lyrics have never been altered. They start with "O Canada! Terre do nos aieux, Ton front est cient de fleurons glorieux" ("O Canada! Land of our forefathers. Your brow is girt with glorious flowers". (girt?? Editor)

English lyrics for "O Canada" first showed up as early as 1906 and the most popular set of words was written by Robert Stanley Weir in 1908. There have been a number of minor word revisions to this version over the years.

For many years in the early life of our country there were two 'unofficial' national anthems – those being "God Save the Queen (King)" (still the national anthem of United Kingdom and realms of the Commonwealth) and "The Maple Leaf Forever". 'O Canada' had also become an 'unofficial' national anthem. In 1967, the 100th birthday of Canada as a nation, our Federal Government approved 'O Canada' as the national anthem. An Act of the Canadian parliament on Canada Day, July 1st, 1980 proclaimed 'O Canada' as the 'official Canadian National Anthem'. Frequently the anthem will be sung with a combination of the French lyrics and the English lyrics. And most recently translations are available in Indigenous languages such as Inuktitut, Cree, Ojibwe and Mi'kmaq.

These are the lyrics of the English version of O Canada.

O Canada! our home and native land,
True patriot love in all of us command.
With glowing hearts we see thee rise
The True North strong and free.
From far and wide, O Canada,
We stand on guard for thee.
God keep our land glorious and free!
O Canada, we stand on guard for thee;
O Canada, we stand on guard for thee!

A MESSAGE FROM NEW HARMONY FOUNDATION INTERNATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE — DONNY ROSE

Hello Evergreen district friends! Donny Rose here, checking in.

In case we have not met, I've proudly been part of our district since the 1980's, am a retired music teacher, former BHS director of education, and now your Harmony Foundation International rep up in Bellingham, Washington. The mission of Harmony Foundation International is to connect people through charitable giving to enrich lives through singing, and it's a great fit for me at this phase of my life.

If you are newer to barbershop (or perhaps just missed it), HFI is a separate organization than the Barbershop Harmony Society. This is how most higher education and hospital philanthropy works. Yep, we at HFI overtly support BHS and are deeply connected, but our first loyalty is to you, the *donor*. This relationship between HFI and BHS was working quite well for many years, until our "troubles" began 3 years ago.



As you may know, the Barbershop Harmony Society sued our <u>volunteer board members</u> of HFI. It's all rather complicated, and eventually BHS settled with HFI a few months ago. The <u>full agreement</u> is available to read online, but I acknowledge that a 45 page legal document is difficult to follow.

A two sentence version of the agreement would be:

The BHS and HFI relationship will look very much like our relationship pre-lawsuit. HFI will be visiting chapters, brigades, and barbershop conventions to raise funds on behalf of BHS. Those funds will be used to help BHS execute their programs.

A checklist version of the main points (leaving out many details) would be:

- HFI will resume raising funds on behalf of BHS
- BHS will cease all fundraising activities
- HFI will make a \$610,000 yearly payment to BHS, made in installments
- A \$1,000,000 Barbershop Harmony Society Endowment Fund shall be created, remain the asset of HFI, but distributions shall be made to BHS
- Donors may now clarify their unrestricted legacy gifts (estate gifts) to HFI, BHS, or some combination of the two
- All New Restricted Gifts to BHS that have a specific purpose must be approved by BHS's Gift Acceptance Committee. Restricted Gifts to Harmony University, Next Generation Barbershop, or any other previously existing BHS program may be accepted without permission.
- BHS may apply for additional funds (beyond the \$610,000) with a grant from HFI or other grant-making organizations
- If BHS grows membership by 5% over the prior fiscal year and HFI's unrestricted giving exceeds \$2.5M, then HFI will increase it's contribution

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

(Key points of HFI/BHS agreement; continued from previous page)

- HFI may continue to support programming like Power of Harmony, AIC Outreach, and Donor Choice to chapters and districts and engage in fundraising with other barbershop-related groups.
- HFI will not be allowed to actively fundraise for SPPBSQSUS in any capacity
- A new system for selecting members of the HFI board
- BHS will assign at least two BHS Fundraising Employees to begin working full time with HFI, with the BHS employees reporting directly to the HFI CEO.

Lawsuits are always painful, but at some point we must come back together as a barbershop family and, well... forgive. For me, as a former staffer at BHS when this law-

suit started and now as an HFI staffer when the lawsuit ended, re-hashing misinformation is counterproductive and pointless. Why would I want to say bad things about the place I used to work and the organization I have loved since the 80's? Why would BHS want to bash the organization that is raising money for the programs they execute?

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE BHS YOUTH POLICY! By Bill Hickman; Evergreen District EVP

ARE YOU WORKING WITH YOUTH?

Are you working with young folks? Do you have students attending your rehearsal? Do you do outreach to schools? Do you interact with youth in any significant way? Have you and your chapter leadership taken the mandatory Youth Protection Training?

Wait...say what? Yes, I said mandatory!

As we seek to share the joy of barbershop harmony in our local areas, one of the obvious target communities is youth. Students who are singing in school are candidates for outreach and even for potential membership. Unfortunately, many of us just leap into this effort without realizing that the Society has developed a comprehensive regimen on **Youth Protection** which must be followed. This regimen is described on the BHS website at https://members.barbershop.org/s/article/Youth-Protection.



The all-important starting point to understand the Society's approach is to read the Youth Policy Statement which not only outlines the policy, but also the Standards of Conduct, as well as the responsibilities of the parties, meaning both BHS members and the involved youth.

Since all we want to do is to share the joy of barbershop, we know our intentions are good. But we must remember that we are dealing with minors, young people who are in our midst only with the understanding and **written consent** of their parents or guardians. If the young person is considering joining your chapter, a Youth Membership Form lays out the requirements. In short, the young person must be accompanied by a parent or guardian and there are requirements laid on the chapter as well.

More importantly, each BHS member working with the youth, e.g., Director, Chapter Officer, Section Leaders, must undergo Youth Protection Training. This training can be viewed on the above-listed site but cannot be taken without first contacting customerservice@barbershop.org which maintains the master list of all BHS members who have received this training. The customer service rep will log your request and send you a link which enables you to take the training. In the past this training was less than stellar, but it has been dramatically improved and is valuable information for all members.

The bottom line is that while we all want to extend the joy of singing to the young people in our area, to ensure the safety of all concerned we must follow the rules. Check them out today.



WORDS OF WISDOM FROM OUR EVERGREEN EVP! By Bill Hickman, Evergreen Executive Vice-President

IS YOUR CHORUS COMPLETELY INSURED?

A visitor to your regular chorus rehearsal trips and falls on the risers, injuring a leg. You call emergency services, and the guest is promptly cared for. Well and good, but Who pays? A more important question is Who is liable? After all, Aren't all BHS choruses insured? The answer is yes, but....

That was the first paragraph of the article on insurance I placed in the last issue of the *Tim-bre*. Although our chapter members are covered for accidents by the master BHS insurance policy and guests by its separate general liability policy, those guests who attend more than three rehearsals are not.



Whether these "perma-guests" are trying to figure out if barbershop really is for them or if they are simply coming for the fun of singing without any intention to join, allowing these folks to participate on the risers for extended periods exposes chapters to increased liability risks because they are not covered by the Society insurance policies.

I am happy to report that since the last issue was published the BHS Staff has identified a solution to this problem. The model already being used to support the various Harmony Brigades and is now being extended for this purpose.

If you have perma-guests and would like them to participate in your chapter activities, send an email to <u>finance@barbershop.org</u> giving the guest's details. For a fee of \$16 per guest they will be covered by the Society insurance policies for a full year.

Chapter Leaders (note I did not limit this to a specific person, but include ALL chapter leaders), do not delay on this one. Every rehearsal you conduct with non-members is a liability risk. Take action today.



EXPANDING ON CURRENT PROJECTS By Greg Kronlund, EVG District Marketing Advisor

Are there any chapter events you can expand on right now? Here are some thoughts:

Due to incredible technological advances, Singing Valentines can produce more reve-



nue than ever. Your chapter now has a global market. Why turn down a chance to do a singing Valentine in New York when Zoom, Facetime, and Microsoft's Meet Now are available? For that matter, smart phones can work just as well. Why not produce a digital Valentine and sell the link for \$5.00? You can perform live or digitally and cover a



huge geographic area for next to nothing.

Christmas usually means events or shows. Why not give your Quartets, VLQs, or chorus an opportunity to expand your chapter's visibility with the Salvation Army? Sing around a kettle, help raise money, and practice your Christmas songs. Pass out invitations to your show and win the hearts of community members and Salvation Army leadership.





Hosting a **judged event?** Invite music educators from your local high schools to be shadow judges. Introduce the local directors to the BHS culture and community, share our similarities, and welcome them into our community. It might open doors to new opportunities for visibility and service.

The **Annual Show** is usually a lot of work, but why not invite other performing organizations to take up some of



the load? Invite the local SAI chapter, high school choir, or performing group to join you. You increase community interest, have more people selling tickets, and become a hero to the other organizations. (Your chorus learns fewer songs, so there is more time to polish.) A word to the wise: with a high school group, don't expect more parents to attend; they often drop the kids off

and pick them up without buying tickets.

There are a lot of ways to expand on what you currently do. If your marketing plan is in place, you have time to search for and brainstorm ideas to expand the events you already have in place.

HEY CHAPTERS.....AVOID 'ANALYSIS PARALYSIS' Offered by GREG KRONLUND, District Marketing Advisor

Don't Let Your Chapter Suffer from "Analysis Paralysis."

Analysis paralysis is the inability to make a choice as a result of overthinking a problem. A group can have an excessive amount of data. As a result, there is unending fighting over the benefits and drawbacks of each alternative and an unwillingness to choose one.

Do your chapter leaders or committees take an extremely long time to decide? Are your initiatives and plans frequently tabled for the next month because of a lack of action? Does your team over-analyze or overthink decisions while waiting for new data? Have you missed opportunities because your chapter fears taking that first step? Do meetings end in arguments or hurt feelings? If you experience this within your chapter governance, you may be suffering from Analysis Paralysis.



Here are four tips to avoid this debilitating symptom:

- **Set a deadline** for making the decision. If you don't have a deadline, you can waste a lot of time going back and forth between several choices, never making a choice. Your most effective course of action is to set a deadline or a specified time for when you need to make the decision.
- Reduce your alternatives as soon as possible. If you have too many possibilities, eliminate some of them right
 away. Determine your desired outcome, and then remove any options that do not meet the requirements of
 that outcome.
- **Practice making** quick decisions. Impulsive behavior isn't always a bad thing. If your chapter is prone to analysis paralysis, practice making minor decisions quickly. Making insignificant decisions rapidly will help you become more decisive when making larger decisions.
- Make use of a <u>decision-making framework</u>: Believe it or not, there is a whole structure for decision-making. Following a step-by-step method can help relieve some of the cognitive load that comes with making a large decision.

There are all kinds of ideas for Chapters to adopt to help grow both members and audiences. There are district people to reach out to and other chapters to share information with. There are two expressions that plague our chapters: "we never did it that way" and "we've always done it this way." We need to break the cycle and try something. There are no failures, only lessons learned.

Now is the time to encourage your chapter to TRY SOMETHING!


TURNS OF PHRASE THAT MIGHT OFFEND (Language Matters Part 1) By Chris Powell, EVG District Secretary

Language Matters – Turns of Phrase that May Cause Others to Turn Away

I have recently encountered turns of phrase that seem harmless enough unless you examine them from other people's perspectives. The particular phrases I've heard recently use language referring to religious concepts or ideas but using them to mean something else. Here's a partial list:

- wheld om straditionally identified as a care-
- Sacred cow Used colloquially to mean any idea or mindset that is strongly held and unexamined for potential faults. The original sense of the term is from Hindu belief. The Wikipedia indicates that "... the cow in Hindu society is traditionally identified as a caretaker and a maternal figure, and Hindu society honors the cow as a symbol of unselfish giving, selfless sacrifice, gentleness and tolerance."
- Guru Used colloquially to mean someone who is expert in some difficult or arcane pursuit. For example, an "IT Guru" is somebody with deep IT knowledge that can solve most related problems. Again, referring to the Wikipedia, guru "is a Sanskrit term for a "mentor, guide, expert, or master" of certain knowledge or field. In pan-Indian traditions, a guru is more than a teacher: traditionally, the guru is a reverential figure to the disciple or student."
- Kosher Used colloquially to mean something that is legitimate and following all applicable rules. The term originally refers to the Jewish practice of following a set of dietary laws dealing with the foods that Jewish people are permitted to eat and how those foods must be prepared according to Jewish law.

That we have twisted and trivialized the use of these terms, removing them from their original faith contexts is a discredit to us all. Equally importantly as we pursue the Everyone in Harmony strategy and work to be inclusive in our chapters, using such language may offend new participants who are members of those faiths. Why take a chance? We all have the opportunity to examine the language that we use for anything that might turn off future barbershoppers. I hope you'll join me in this pursuit.



YOUWANT ME TO DO WHAT? (Language matters part 2) By Chris Powell, EVG District Secretary

Language Matters – You Want Me to Do What?

A conversation I recently overheard at a chapter rehearsal between a long-time barbershopper (LTB) and a new participant (NP):

LTB: Would you like to sing a tag?

NP: Ummm....


LTB: Its like the coda of a song.

NP: Ok, I guess?



Here we have a well-intentioned LTB doing their level best to be inclusive with an NP and offering to engage with them. The problem? The NP has no idea what the LTB is talking about. Even if they have experienced a type of music where a coda is common, they still may not get what the LTB is on about. It is a shame that they've missed an opportunity to inform and engage the NP in a way that they will understand and feel confident in joining.

So what's missing? Tag singing is a deep and unique cultural element of the barbershop world. We sing tags because they're fun, can be taught easily by ear, and enable singing with diverse groups (friends and strangers, experienced and rookies alike!), and offer a chance for mastery of an arcane art. If the NP knew these simple facts about singing a tag, and further had a quick understanding of how tags are taught, they would be far more likely to want to join right in. A skill that all LTBs should learn as we seek to include others in barbershop, is how to communicate to NPs using language that will be familiar from the NP's (i.e., non-barbershop) perspective. In this case, a quick prepared speech (an elevator pitch) about the basics of what tags are, why we sing them, and how we teach them is the essential tool that the LTB should have in their pursuit of engaging NPs. In fact, we all should have that elevator pitch memorized.



IMPROVING YOUR CHAPTER FINANCES By Larry Breitbarth, Evergreen District Treasurer

As your Evergreen District Treasurer, I'm here to share ideas on how you can improve your chapter finances, especially ways to increase revenues. In addition to filling seats at your chapter shows, here are some things that chapters in the Evergreen District are doing.

Fundraising events

Many chapters fundraise through parking and other member-supported events. These activities provide income that is unrelated to our nonprofit mission. The Internal Revenue Service will generally allow nonprofits to have just one major fundraiser a year and still maintain their nonprofit status.



If you are looking for help in running a nonprofit fundraiser, please reach out to me and I will connect you with successful fundraisers in the Evergreen District.

Grants

Chapters in the Evergreen District participate in collective nonprofit fundraising, where participating organizations solicit contributions from individuals in a focused giving campaign. One such event is the Kistsap (County) Great Give. In addition to individual contributions, matching funds are often offered by donors. Another source of funds is grant applications to large endowments that support nonprofits (e.g., Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation). If you need help with grant writing, I can connect you with successful grant writers in the Evergreen District.

Interest Income

Most chapters keep their funds in a non-interest-bearing checking account. Money market accounts and Certificates of Deposit are now paying annual interest rates of four or five percent. Work with your banker to figure out whether your chapter has excess funds that could be moved to earn interest for the chapter.

Chapter treasurers - if you want further quidance on the steps involved, please reach out directly to me.



August (OK, it's September when the Timbre is published but just in case you need reminding... ed.)

• Verify Nominating Committee is preparing the Slate of Officers for the coming year.

September

- Set date for the Annual Chapter Meeting at which the next year's chapter officers will be elected. Per the Standard Chapter Bylaws, this must be before October 15th of each year and announced to the members at least two weeks prior to the meeting.
- (Pres/Sec) Receive the coming year's proposed slate of officers and give a copy to the Secretary to send a notice to the membership of the Annual Chapter Meeting including the proposed slate of officers.

Prepare to have your chapter represented at the Fall District House of Delegates Meeting in October in Federal Way



If your chorus or quartet is heading to the District Convention in October, take advantage of the ramp-up to share what you're up to. Here are just a handful of the endless ideas to get the word out there:

- -Share a short clip of a contest song.
- -Highlight a new member singing in a contest for the first time.
- -Interview someone from your music team about your song selection or preparation plan.
- -Record a POV from the risers during choreography rehearsal or a run-through.
- -Ask a controversial question that has two answers, but not "yes" or "no." For example:
- "Ballads or up-tunes?" "Identical outfits or just matching/themed colors?" "Do songs sound better in Bb or Eb?"

25 YEARS AGO IN EVERGREEN'S HISTORY!! By Ken and Judy Galloway, District Historians

BRING BACK THE GOOD OL' DAYS - "We Kinda Miss Those Good Old Days!"

Twenty-five years ago in Eugene, EVG had 22 quartets in the District competition - including The Boon Brothers, Peanut Butter Conspiracy, Don't Get Me Started!, and the winning quartet was Studio One! Song titles included "If All my Dreams," and "We Kinda Miss Those Good Old Days"

That same contest, 15 choruses competed! A good size crowd came together in Forest Grove, Oregon to become part of the Tualatin Valley Harmony Masters' Ballad Town In The Grove Picnic 2023. In the audience today, were a few of those early singers – who could tell stories about those early days: Chuck Olson (Aliens quartet) is still a member of the TVHM chapter and during the picnic he sang with the chorus, a pick-up quartet, and directed the mass sing; Ron Johnson, who joined SPEBSQSA in 1952 was enjoying the afternoon – I first heard him sing in "Autumn Gold" with his brother back in the 90's; and also in the crowd, was Ray Heller, baritone of the 1970's EVG Champs "The Poets" who was telling about the original Ballad Town events (his quartet won Ballad Town in 1971 and 1972).

Entertainment today included established quartets, the Tualatin Valley Harmony Masters, Happenstance Quartet, and eight pick-up quartets including singers of all ages! It was a wonderful and relaxing day to be with friends and singing songs we all remember. Thank you TVHM for the work you put into this great event.
