

FROM THE DISTRICT REP FOR CONTESTS & JUDGING By JAY KRUMBHOLZ, Evergreen DRCJ

With every contest, there's always a few administrative fires to put out before the competitors take the stage. I always share those thoughts afterwards in hopes of avoiding similar issues in the future. In almost all cases, many of these problems can be avoided if the competitors stay on top of things, namely:

1. Please make sure that all members of your quartet (and chorus) are current with BHS dues well in advance of the contest date. When each quartet submits a contest entry, I check each member's renewal date to see if it expires prior to the contest. I make note of those members whose membership will expire prior contest (and when that expiration date is) and I let the quartet administrator know. I also reach out to that member and ask him/her to get the renewal done ASAP. Although the auto-renewal option is a great way to handle your dues, there was one case when the member's credit card was declined three weeks before contest and the member never knew! (The card on file with BHS had



expired and the member had forgotten to update the credit card information.) The matter was settled the night before contest! Another quartet member had let his membership expire in July. After 90 days BHS treats renewals as a "new" membership, so it was not simply a matter that could be handled online. The member was calling BHS the week of the contest to take care of this.

2. Make sure that the quartet/chorus administrator is someone who stays on top of all communication and make sure that all contact information is current and active. I encountered two issues this past fall: first, the email address for one quartet was an old one that the owner rarely checked. My repeated emails about a potential problem went unanswered and almost cost this quartet a DQ at the district contest. Second, another quartet's administrator was someone who simply never bothered to do things like answer my emails or update the quartet's repertoire list. When I contacted other members of the group, I was told, "He's not very good with stuff like that." Yikes! Pro tip: do have someone from the group who *is* good at handling the quartet/chorus entry stuff.

3. Make sure your quartet profile page is completely filled out, with member names and contact information, repertoire, etc. I had to use the quartet's entry form to figure out who was in the quartet because the quartet profile page was completely blank! If your quartet plans to sing custom arrangements, get the copyright clearance right away. Copyright clearance can take weeks or even a couple of months, so don't try to begin the process in September.

Okay, so the issues I mentioned above are easily handled in August, but when October 1 rolls around and I'm still seeing expired BHS memberships, then things become urgent—and the ADM judges are talking to me about not letting certain groups perform because they have an 'illegal' member. It becomes a headache for your DRCJ!

The solution for the quartets is very simple. The DRCJ won't approve a contest entry if:

- your quartet has a member whose membership has lapsed. I'll acknowledge receipt of the entry form, but I'll
 let the quartet know so they can handle it. If at the time of contest entry all members are in good standing, I'll
 approve the entry.
- your quartet profile page does not contain a repertoire list. When you form a new quartet, go ahead and add whatever current songs are in your repertoire. You can always add new songs to the repertoire as your group learns them.

- 1. Notify District Secretary of show via evgdistrict.com http://evgdistrict.com .
- 2. Complete and file hard copy Clearance Report with District Secretary.
- 3. District Secretary will notify the District Director of Communications of the approval.
- 4. Send your information and poster to District Director of Communications.

DIRECTOR SHOWCASE — BILL BORAH Music Director Rogue Voices (Medford, OR)

Bill was a charter member of the San Luis Obispo, CA Chapter in 1963 and has been a member of the Barbershop Harmony Society for 60 years. He has been a front-line Director of 7 chapters– San Luis Obispo, CA; Santa Barbara, CA; Medford, OR; Reno, NV; Santa Rosa, CA; Bay Area Metro, CA and Sacramento, CA. He is a charter member of the Far Western District Chorus Directors Guild and has been awarded the Barbershopper Of The Year award from the San Luis Obispo, Reno, Santa Rosa, Bay Area Metro and Sacramento chapters. He has sung in many quartets in 3 different voice parts - most have been finalists in District competition. His quartet, Potluck, was the Far Western District Senior Quartet Champions in 1999 and competed at Sr. International competition 4 times. He was an Assistant Director of the Voices of California from 2009 – 2014. The 2020 International competition in Charlotte was his 8th chorus appearance on the International stage.



DIRECTOR SHOWCASE — LOGAN SHEVALIER Music Director—Lilac City Voices (Spokane, WA)

A native of Coeur d'Alene, ID, Logan grew up singing in choirs and joined the Lake City Harmonizers in 2014. Soon after he joined the Lilac City Voices (then the Pages of Harmony) in 2015, singing lead and tenor in both choruses. He also sang tenor in the quartet Off the Clock, performing across the Spokane-Coeur d'Alene area.

An accomplished classical vocalist and director, Logan has performed as a recital soloist and in opera choruses, with repertoire ranging from Puccini to Britten. In 2021, he served as assistant director to his university's a cappella choir.

Logan received his Bachelor of Arts in Music from Austin College in Sherman, TX, and has studied under Andrea Olsen, Wayne Crannell, and Scott Rednour. He moved to Spokane in 2022 and started directing the Lilac City Voices in August of 2022."



THE FORGOTTEN BOARD MEMBER By BILL HICKMAN, Evergreen President

The Forgotten Position

The position of Immediate Past President is one that is often overlooked and forgotten about on chapter boards. In fact, it is one of the most important and influential.

The IPP is the person who previously ran the entire chapter. Formally, he or she serves as an advisor to the chapter president, but informally, this person knows how to get things done in the chapter. This person has insights about the personalities and capabilities of almost everyone in the chapter and can be a key voice in planning.

The current president should be able to lean on the IPP for assistance on any topic. Having been in the position before makes the IPP a unique asset but it is important to remember that the IPP is probably a little tired, so the current president should be careful not to overload this person (especially in the early days and weeks of the new president's term) but is someone on whom the president can rely.

It is vital for the president to develop and maintain a good relationship with the IPP.



WHAT IS YOUR CHAPTER PLAN FOR 2024 By BOB COX, EVG Chapter Development Director

Chapter Development Update

What is your chapter/chorus plan for the year?

As a leader for your chapter/chorus/singing community, it's important to have a plan for the year. Having a plan with milestones to measure your success is essential for growth. Nobody wants to fail!

You all should have had a yearly planning meeting to establish goals and objectives. From this meeting you should have a calendar to share with your members. Dates on

the calendar should include: rehearsal night, board meetings, special committee meetings, guest nights, chapter shows, projected performances, social events, convention weekend and HCNW to name a few. Don't forget those special days such as Valentines, Mother's Day, July 4th, Thanksgiving and Christmas. You might also include individual members' birth dates and anniversaries on the chapter calendar. This is a great reminder to your Sunshine person to send a card, and for you as a leader to personally call that individual and offer best wishes. That's what successful leaders do.

In your planning make sure your music teams do the same. Set dates for when you plan to introduce new songs, set dates for when members need to be off paper. Set dates for special rehearsals, coaching and retreats. Share those dates with your members and hold each other accountable for their completion. Adjustments may be needed along the way, but have a plan, then work that plan. Everyone will then know the expectations and can plan accordingly.

If you plan to take a break during the summer or special holidays, make sure those dates are also on your calendar. Members can then plan vacations and other personal events.

As we move through the year, the Chapter Development Team and District Board members will be reaching out to you to schedule a time to visit or maybe even stop in at a rehearsal or show, to talk about your successes and challenges. These two Teams are focusing 2024 around the Chapter/Chorus/Singing Community in combined efforts to help serve you better. We know every organization is unique to themselves, but we also know that we all face many of the same obstacles and challenges. Membership growth and retention, director development, organizational roadblocks, lack of community outreach plan, outdated marketing and public relations processes, lack of succession planning, and budget restraints are common among us all.

To help you in these challenging areas the District's Chapter Development program has funds set aside to secure coaching for your chorus and/or quartets. Scholarship funds to send directors, music team members, and individual members to Harmony College NW where they can bring back innovative ideas and tools to help you musically or administratively. The Chapter Development Team has subject matter specialists who are willing to share ideas and suggestions on membership recruitment/orientation/retention and how community outreach can help attract singers. The District's Marketing Team can help suggest new ways to tell your story. Funding is also available to host a day long leadership training, in which neighboring chapter leaders can meet in a central location to share ideas, best practices, and learn from each other.

If resources might help you in your planning for success, please reach out to me via email, text, or cell. Let's work together to make 2024 your most rewarding year as a leader. What are your plans for the year?

The Communications team encourages input to help us improve. The FREE EVG District APP can be downloaded on your phone, tablet, or desktop from the <u>Apple App Store</u> or <u>Google Play</u>.

Not receiving email notifications? Make sure your email is visible in the BHS member center. We use the BHS bimonthly database for all mailings. To submit articles to any publication, email <u>communications@evgdistrict.com</u> for consideration.



THE TAXMAN COMETH! By LARRY BREITBARTH, EVG District Treasurer

Ben Franklin famously said that nothing is certain except death and taxes . As your District Treasurer, I cannot help you avoid your inevitable demise. However, I can help you with your chapter's tax compliance.

Each chapter in the district is required to submit an annual tax filing to the IRS. For chapters with gross receipts less than \$50,000, there is a simple filing requirement – the 990N or "postcard," where the chapter is confirming that it does not need to file a form 990. For chapters with more than \$50,000 in gross receipts, a form 990 must be filed.



Returns are due May 15, 2024 and can be extended to November 15. Note that for chapters with multiple choruses, the activity of each chorus – revenues and expenses - needs to be consolidated at the chapter level.

Occasionally chapters fall out of compliance and fail to file an IRS Form 990. This may happen when there is change in Treasurers. If a chapter does not file with the IRS for three consecutive years, it may receive the "death penalty," where the IRS revokes their 501c(3)nonprofit status. A chapter's nonprofit status can be reinstated, but it is an arduous process.

As your District Treasurer, I am available to answer your questions about these various tax filing requirements. Chapter Treasurers and Presidents should meet at least once a year to confirm that the chapter is in compliance. If your chapter is out of compliance, I can help you get back on track.

BUD LEABO FUND SENDS AN UPDATE By CHRIS POWELL, Chairman Bud Leabo Memorial Fund

The Bud Leabo Memorial Fund (BLMF) is working on a major revision to its website to significantly improve the clarity of the processes for requesting BLMF scholarships and grants.

In the meantime, here are some key things to consider while making grant requests. Depending on the level of funding the chapter seeks for that program (the bigger the request, the more detail we need to see), the Trustees will want to understand key elements of the proposed program including:

- the complete budget including additional sources of funding,
- the level of participation of the chapter in developing and delivering the program,
- the qualifications of any coaching staff,
- the marketing plan for reaching out to the public to gain their interest and participation in the program, and
- how you see the program impacting the public's knowledge of and participation in barbershop singing.

The BLMF is a non-profit affiliate of the Evergreen District with an endowment supporting barbershop education and membership growth within the Evergreen District. This year BLMF celebrates the 40th anniversary of the first Trustees meeting at the District Convention in Spokane, WA. The Fund was formed in 1981 as a memorial to John H. "Bud" Leabo, a founding member of the Eugene chapter and Evergreen District, 21-year chapter director, District President, and Barbershopper of the Year for both the Eugene chapter and the District.

The Quartet Contests had already been held and I got to sit in the audience for that! When the Aliens appeared on stage wearing their 'plaid' suits and straw hats, Chuck was seen to have a piece of white paper stuck to the heal of his left shoe! The Bass pointed this out to Chuck, who then picked the paper off his shoe only to find that it was sticky and stuck to his hand! The Quarter sang on while that piece of paper made its way from singer to singer, ending up on the Tenor's shoulder, who then took the sticky paper and wiped it off on his back during the 'Tag Spread' only to have it appear stuck to Chuck's left hand, at the other end of the Quartet, as **he** did the 'Tag Spread' !! No one that I spoke to could say what song they were singing because it was drowned out by the audience's laughter !! (o:}

The Chorus Competitions were held the afternoon of the next day and I was 'in the wings' preparing to MC the contest !

As I recall, (and it's been a long time now) the Valley Harmonizers were first on, so I went on stage (behind the closed curtain) to give them all

a "Thumbs Up" and to wish them "Good Luck", when I noticed that they were all dressed in cowboy outfits, and they had an 'electric' campfire at center stage, as part of the 'cowboy atmosphere' ! Then I noticed a distinct rancid smell, and traced it to the frying pan that was placed on the 'fire' ! The frying pan was full of very fresh Horse Manure !!! I looked at the frying pan, then I looked back at the Chorus and someone volunteered to say

..... "That's just our Little Private Joke !!" I guess that's Barbershop, eh ?? (o:}

I don't recall the year, but the Aliens were on stage at District Competitions (again). They were again attired in their tartan suits and straw hats. As they entered the second song, Chuck accidentally dropped his hat on the floor in front of the quartet, which was in performing position, not far from the edge of the stage. As Chuck went to re-trieve his hat, he "accidently" kicked it, and it slid forward and dropped off the stage, falling between the Judges

Tables and the edge of the stage ! The Quartet kept singing while Chuck went to try to get his hat ! He hung himself over the edge of the stage in an attempt to reach his hat (on the floor) but he reached too far and fell off the stage and into that space between the Judges Tables and the Stage !! Needless to say, he contacted the Judges Table on the way down and on regaining his hat, he got up (still in that space between tables and stage) and started to "fix" matters by shuffling the Judges Papers around and realigning their lamps !! The Judges put the run on him, so Chuck made his way to the steps that went up onto Stage Left. These steps had a bit of a 'fence' to prevent anyone from falling off sideways, and Chuck somehow managed to "trip" over this and fall Head down on the steps. With his feet up in the air, he went down two or three of the steps on the back of his shoulders, with his feet up in the air !! Reaching the bottom step, he got to his feet, pick up his hat, and went up the steps onto the stage!

The "quartet" (minus Chuck) had finished the song and left the stage, so Chuck was left to find his own way off ! He was groping the curtains in search of the opening and the audience reaction was so loud that Chuck turned to the audience to half apologize and half accept their adulation, and in so doing he backed up against the curtains. Suddenly, two hands came out from under the curtains, grabbed Chuck by each ankle, and yanked him so he fell flat on his face, and then he was "zipped" under the curtain and out of site !! Again !! I still don't know what they were singing because of the audience's reactions !!

Chuck will be sadly missed, and probably never really replaced !!


CHAPTER ETERNAL - **ALAN GOWANS** By BOB ROBSON, Calgary Foothills Chapter

Alan Gowans was born in Edinburgh, Scotland on July 18, 1926 and passed away peacefully in his sleep in Calgary on January 4, 2024. Before coming to Canada Alan served as a paratrooper in the British Army (despite being a proud Scotsman through and through). A crooner at heart, his velvet voice lent its tones to several big bands in England. His love of music and singing led him to the Barbershop Harmony Society where he was a member for over 60 years – most of this time in Calgary, although he did have a short stint as a member of the East York Chapter in the Toronto area.

He spent time with both Calgary area men's barbershop choruses and numerous quartets over the years and he will also be remembered for many contributions to the Evergreen District – including District President in 1984-85; Barbershopper of the Year in 1989; and, Hall of Fame inductee in 2003. His biggest accomplishment for Evergreen and the BHS was serving as the General Chairman for the 1993 International Convention hosted in Calgary. This convention turned out to be the largest convention ever held by the BHS, with over 11,300 attendees. Way to go Mr. Gowans!!

At Alan's request, there was no formal celebration of life for Alan, but on January 11, 2024 about 30 of his Calgary singing friends met at the Kensington Legion to raise a glass or two in his honor and to share stories. Always a man willing to do more than his part, Alan will be fondly remembered for his legacy of harmony, camaraderie and leadership.


CHAPTER ETERNAL - BILL BUSH

From Willie's Wife:

Willie Kleen, a 54-year member of the Barbershop Harmony Society, began singing in high school with Chuck Olson (The Aliens) Dale Deiser (Mark Four, 1969 international champions), and Gale Hering. The Minor Chords competed in the Forest Grove Ballad Town Contest in 1952, '53, and '54. Willie was an emeritus member of the Masters of Harmony Chorus, singing with them to win 3 international chorus contests. In the Far Western District, he sang with the well-known arranger, Earl Moon, in Four Points West, a popular quartet that performed on many chapter shows. In 2004, he returned to the Ballad Town contest with John Burri, Paul Olguin and Jeff Welch in quartet called Hometown Harmony. Along the way, he made many good friends that he valued highly.

From Paul Olguin:

Willie Kleen came onto my radar when I first heard his quartet, *Four Points West*, sometime in the late 1970s. They were from the Whittier, California Chapter, which was just a few miles from where I lived. The legendary Earl Moon was their baritone, and Willie sang bass. Other parts changed over the years, but it was always Earl and Willie in the bass clef. Willie was as rock solid and smooth a barbershop bass singer as there ever was, and *Four Points West* was a great quartet. They sang the best songs arranged by Earl and were a such an entertaining show quartet. They easily could have made the top twenty at International if they'd had the chance, but back in those days each district was allotted only a certain number of quartets. *Four Points West* was often right on the bubble, but they never did get to go to the big show—sad for the folks outside of our District who never got to hear them. They were also one of the finest Far Western District quartets never to win the District Championship, placing second three times in a row.

Fast forward to 2005. I moved to Portland, Oregon, and there was Willie, singing with Bridge Town Sound, as rock solid and smooth as ever. It was wonderful to have a chance to become better acquainted with one of my early barbershop role models. Then in late 2007, one of Bridge Town Sound's new members, Jeff Welsh, was trying to put together a quartet for The All Northwest Barbershop Quartet Contest, aka Ballad Town. Jeff had long been a member of the West Side Singers who had sponsored the competition since it began in the 1940s. For many years he'd had a dream of singing in a quartet and maybe even making the top eight. He wasn't having any luck putting a quartet together, so I stepped in to see if I could help. I got our director, John Burri, on board to sing tenor. Willie signed on as bass, and since Jeff wanted to sing baritone, I ended up on lead. And so, *Hometown Harmony* was formed.

Willie was no stranger to the Ballad Town stage. He'd competed several times in a high school quartet in the 1950s and hadn't been back since. His high school quartet, which included some future barbershop legends, never did make the top eight back then; so, like Jeff, Willie also had a dream to fulfill. When we first got together we sounded okay, but lead was not my best part, and Jeff was still pretty new to singing barbershop baritone. But with Willie on bass and a handful Earl's classic charts, we had a sturdy foundation to build on. We worked hard for several months, and on that Friday evening in March, 2008, our efforts paid off. We made the top eight at Ballad Town!

Willie retired from quartet singing shortly after that to spend more time with family. Hometown Harmony went on to compete, with varying levels of success, at Ballad Town for the next eleven years until it finally ended its 70+ year run in 2019. I'd say Willie had a pretty great run, too. I consider myself so lucky to have been a young barber-shopper in the days of *Four Points West*, and blessed beyond measure to have had the chance, thirty years later, to sing in a quartet with Willie and become his friend.

Opinion: Practice or Rehearse – Your Choice

Have you ever wondered about the difference between a chorus practice and a chorus rehearsal?

Does your chorus night include ill-prepared sectionals, waiting for the director to teach another section their notes, or members of your sections duplicating another part? It might be that you are having chorus practice.


What would it be like to attend a chorus with everyone knowing the notes and words accurately, four-part chords exploding in your ear, and the director starting to talk about nuance and intent and being able to experiment with rhythms and interpretation? If your chorus is doing this, you are at a **rehearsal**.

Harmony Platoon Chorus is an example of rehearsing because the members come from far and wide to participate, learn their music at home, and form briefly with a director, ready to make the notes and words musical. Harmony Platoon choruses are a living, breathing example of a rehearsal.

There is a great article in the January/February issue of The Harmonizer (pages 12–13) that everyone should read entitled **"Practice and Rehearsal are Not the Same Thing."**

Dr. Jay Dougherty indicates, "Singing in a chorus is not just about hitting the right notes; it's about creating something that is greater than the sum of its parts." (The Harmonizer, p. 13)

However, the director's work begins when the chorus has learned those notes and words, and the director, like a great musician, begins the process of making music. To create a sound that is greater than the sum of the parts. If you want to help your director, then **do your part!** Give him or her their gold medal moment every rehearsal night. You can do it.

WAIT, I Need A License For THAT? By CHRIS POWELL, EVG District Secretary

Wait, I need a license for THAT?!

With many chapters doing sing-outs and accepting donations for them, we've had the question of whether those require BMI/SESAC licensing.

When an ensemble is invited by another party to perform - whether paid or for free - they are considered a "work-for-hire" under current US law and are not liable to do ASCAP/BMI/SESAC licensing for that performance.

Most retirement homes, healthcare facilities, and schools are managed by parent entities that ensure legalities are in place. However, smaller, stand-alone business and facilities might not!



So, several of our chapters have filed ASCAP and BMI/SESAC reports/payments for peace of mind by avoiding passing the liability of music licensing on to those businesses without them knowing it.

Regarding chapter-produced events that are not ticketed but free-will donations are accepted to benefit the chapter financially, these events are *not* exempt from ASCAP and BMI/SESAC reporting and should be submitted with payment accordingly.

WHERE DID THAT SONG COME FROM?

YOU ARE MY SUNSHINE

(Information derived from Wikipedia)

You are my sunshine, my only sunshine. You make me happy when skies are gray. You'll never know, dear, how much I love you. Please don't take my sunshine away.

There is some very interesting history behind this song. Controversy remains over who was the composer and when it was composed. Despite the disputed origins of the song, it has become extremely popular and well known – having been recorded by over 350 artists and translated into 30 different languages. It was written sometime between 1930 and 1939 and several folks claim to have written it. Early recordings of this song appeared in the mid-1930's and over the years a number of great artists have performed it – including – Gene Autry, Bing Crosby, Doris Day and Johnny Cash. It is one of the official songs of the state of Louisiana. It was given a Grammy Hall of Fame award in 1990 and it has been named one of the top 100 (#73) Greatest Songs in Country Music.

A MESSAGE ABOUT HARMONY FOUNDATION By DONNY ROSE, Harmony Foundation Representative

(This is a reprint from Donny's article in the Sept/2023 issue of the Timbre)

Hello Evergreen district friends! Donny Rose here, checking in.

In case we have not met, I've proudly been part of our district since the 1980's, am a retired music teacher, former BHS director of education, and now your Harmony Foundation International rep up in Bellingham, Washington. The mission of <u>Harmony</u> Foundation International is to connect people through charitable giving to enrich lives through singing, and it's a great fit for me at this phase of my life.

If you are newer to barbershop (or perhaps just missed it), HFI is a separate organization than the Barbershop Harmony Society. This is how most higher education and

hospital philanthropy works. Yep, we at HFI overtly support BHS and are deeply connected, but our first loyalty is to you, the *donor*. This relationship between HFI and BHS was working quite well for many years, until our "troubles" began 3 years ago.

As you may know, the Barbershop Harmony Society sued our <u>volunteer board members</u> of HFI. It's all rather complicated, and eventually BHS settled with HFI a few months ago. The <u>full agreement</u> is available to read online, but I acknowledge that a 45 page legal document is difficult to follow.

A two sentence version of the agreement would be:

The BHS and HFI relationship will look very much like our relationship pre-lawsuit. HFI will be visiting chapters, brigades, and barbershop conventions to raise funds on behalf of BHS. Those funds will be used to help BHS execute their programs.

A checklist version of the main points (leaving out many details) would be:

HFI will resume raising funds on behalf of BHS

BHS will cease all fundraising activities

- HFI will make a \$610,000 yearly payment to BHS, made in installments
- A \$1,000,000 Barbershop Harmony Society Endowment Fund shall be created, remain the asset of HFI, but distributions shall be made to BHS
- Donors may now clarify their unrestricted legacy gifts (estate gifts) to HFI, BHS, or some combination of the two

- All New Restricted Gifts to BHS that have a specific purpose must be approved by BHS's Gift Acceptance Committee. Restricted Gifts to Harmony University, Next Generation Barbershop, or any other previously existing BHS program may be accepted without permission.
- BHS may apply for additional funds (beyond the \$610,000) with a grant from HFI or other grant-making organizations
- If BHS grows membership by 5% over the prior fiscal year and HFI's unrestricted giving exceeds \$2.5M, then HFI will increase it's contribution
- HFI may continue to support programming like Power of Harmony, AIC Outreach, and Donor Choice to chapters and districts and engage in fundraising with other barbershop-related groups.
- HFI will not be allowed to actively fundraise for SPPBSQSUS in any capacity
- A new system for selecting members of the HFI board
- BHS will assign at least two BHS Fundraising Employees to begin working full time with HFI, with the BHS employees reporting directly to the HFI CEO.

Lawsuits are always painful, but at some point we must come back together as a barbershop family and, well... forgive. For me, as a former staffer at BHS when this lawsuit started and now as an HFI staffer when the lawsuit ended, re-hashing misinformation is counterproductive and pointless. Why would I want to say bad things about the place I used to work and the organization I have loved since the 80's? Why would BHS want to bash the organization that is raising money for the programs they execute?

I also recognize that before you are comfortable with your charitable giving, you may have questions about the settlement. I get it. A CAPPELLA NORTHWEST TO HOST FINNISH CHORUS!

On April 14, *A Cappella Northwest* (Northwest Sound and Northwest Mix) will perform a joint concert, **Nordic Meets Northwest**, with Akademiska Sångföreningen (Academic Singing Association, "Akademen"), an historic 60 voice male chorus from Finland. Akademen is appearing as part of their two-week West Coast tour beginning in San Francisco and ending in Vancouver, BC.

This unique opportunity arose through a personal connection between *A Cappella Northwest* director Ken Potter and his *Akademen* friend and barbershopper Atte Heikkinen, a member of the group. Members of *A Cappella Northwest* are hosting the *Akademen* singers in their homes providing the opportunity to form lasting bonds with our Nordic neighbors based on our mutual love of harmony.

Akademen was founded in 1838 at what is today the University of Helsinki, making them the oldest extant choir in Finland. At that time, the emerging Finnish nation was part of the Russian Empire, and in 1848 the choir debuted "Vart Land" (Our Land), a composition by their Germanborn founder and director Frederik Pacius, which became the national anthem of independent Finland. Pacius is known as "the father of Finnish music".

As a Fennoswedish (i.e. Swedishspeaking) organization, the choir has always seen it as important to champion the Swedish-speaking minority culture in Finland. Since its founding, *Akademen* works to preserve the classical Finnish male voice repertoire, but in the 1970s and 80s the choir expanded into more modern material, producing the successful *Akademen a la Carte* concert series including compositions by members of the choir.

All three choruses will perform with some combined numbers offering members of *A Cappella Northwest* the unique challenge of singing in Swedish! The show is at Juanita High School Performing Arts Center in Kirkland, Washington, April 14 at 2:30 pm.


